Rates of infection from the virus are rising among Latinos in Marin, families with school-aged children are struggling to understand and prepare for remote learning, and people who work in low-wage jobs are challenged to put food on the table even as their efforts provide essential support to our local economy. Adding to all of this, the current administration continues to launch attacks on the immigrant community, including its recent memo calling for undocumented residents to be excluded from participating in the 2020 Census, and its recent announcement of new rules blocking first-time applications for DACA.



Top 5 things you need to know about the new DHS DACA memo

The Trump Administration put out a new memo on July 28, 2020, dismantling the DACA Program. This comes after Trump ignored the Supreme Court's decision by delaying the acceptance of new DACA applications. Here's a quick FAQ from our friends at <u>United We Dream</u> on what the memo means:

1. I thought we won at the Supreme Court, what happened, can they do this?

would attack the program again. This memo will be challenged in the courts and we will keep fighting, but for now, it stands. 2. So what does this mean for current DACA recipients?

We always knew our victory at the Supreme Court was temporary and that Trump

Current DACA recipients who have no renewal pending remain the same status

and their protections will expire as indicated on their work permits. If you are planning to apply or renew your DACA, the new memo states that your renewal will only be extended for one year, not two. 3. What does it mean for pending applications?

Current pending renewals will only be granted for 1 year instead of the previous two year period. Pending new DACA applications will be rejected. Advance parole requests will be rejected unless applicants can prove 'exceptional circumstances'.


4. Make no mistake, this is a direct attack on undocumented youth.

And the first step to dismantling DACA altogether. Trump is putting the lives of immigrant youth and their families in danger of deportation and as long as he is in the White House he will not stop attacking DACA.

5. Join us and fight back.

Demand the Senate pass permanent protections that help people without hurting people, like the Dream and Promise Act (HR6) and defund the Deportation Machine by reducing the budget for ICE and CBP by sending an email to your senator.
